Tim was 18 years old when he suddenly became a quadriplegic in a diving accident. The three Assistance Dogs that Tim has had so far — first Buster, then Roxy, and now Casper (pictured with Tim) — have helped him achieve the same dreams he had before his accident.

With determination, the opportunity of a fair go, and the support of his Assistance Dogs, Tim has gained purpose and a career he loves.

Today, Tim is a husband and father, as well as a board member of Assistance Dogs Australia. He is also a *Furever Friend*. He said:

Before Watson came into Max's life, Max struggled with emotional regulation both at school and at home. His daily life often involved frequent phone calls from the school and multiple suspensions.

Since Watson arrived, he has supported Max in many meaningful ways. Thanks to Watson, Max's social skills and confidence have significantly improved; more people are likely to engage with Max because he has Watson, which in turn creates social opportunities that he might not normally get.

Max even attended a 12-night Scouts jamboree without Watson - a major achievement. When they are together, Watson provides comfort through deep pressure on Max's leg, which helps him stay calm and regulated.




Assistance Dogs have already changed so many lives, but there is much more to be done.

Alessia, 13, has quadriplegic cerebral palsy. Alessia's mum, Christine, said: "Alessia cannot complete basic tasks like brushing her teeth on her own, so therefore has lost all of her independence".

Ebony, an intelligent black Labrador, was given to Alessia. On a daily basis, Ebony can:


- Open and close doors for Alessia
- Retrieve dropped items and put them in Alessia's lap, like mobile phones, pens, toys and slippers
- Alert bark if Alessia is in distress
- Press pedestrian buttons
- Calm down Alessia when no-one else can

Now with Ebony by her side, ambitious Alessia has the support she needs to face the unknowns of teenagehood – and flourish. This is why your support is so important.

Becoming a Furever Friend is one of the most selfless things you can do, and the best way to make sure that the generosity you have shown during your life carries on beyond it.

Stephane served in the armed forces for 18 years, both at home and abroad. He has been living with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) for the past ten years and now has an Assistance Dog named Veo. Stephane said:

Lo is an Educational Support Dog in an Autism Support Unit in a Sydney high school. Lo helps young people who are at a crucial turning point in their lives.

How will you remember Assistance Dogs Australia?

There are three key ways you can include Assistance Dogs Australia in your Will:

Residuary Bequest

A residuary bequest is a gift of the remainder of your estate (or a percentage of it) after all your other wishes have been fulfilled and expenses met. Because the value of your gift will rise with inflation, it will be worth as much to us tomorrow as it is today.

- Pecuniary Bequest
 - A pecuniary bequest is simply a gift of a specific amount of money. For example, \$5,000.
- Specific Bequest

 A specific bequest is a gift of a specific item of value. For example a painting or a property.

Please be sure to discuss these options with a solicitor. They'll ensure that your loved ones and the causes you hold dear benefit from your Will exactly as you would wish.



Writing a Bequest

In drafting or amending your Will to include Assistance Dogs Australia, you may like to use the following wording:

"I GIVE AND BEQUEATH to 'Assistance Dogs Australia Limited' my Estate (or___% of my Estate, or "the sum of \$_____") for its general purposes and I DECLARE that the receipt of the secretary or other proper officer for the time being of Assistance Dogs Australia Limited (ABN: 90 074 746 160) shall be a full discharge for my trustees for the bequest."
